GSHG Council Update

The Program Team has been busy planning Summer Camp 2023. GSHG is proud to offer twoweeks of resident camp at Camp Tanglewood, Camp Low, and Camp Martha Johnston this year, and a STEM Camp hosted on the campus of Valdosta State University.

New this year: Senior and Ambassador Girl Scouts have been heard and will have more options! They can choose from traditional camp programs, Counselor-in-Training (CIT) programs, and adventure travel trips. Campers can choose from the following adventure travel trips: a three-night trip to the North Carolina mountains, a 2-night trip to Cumberland Island, or a 2-night canoe trip on the Ocmulgee River.

For Daisies, Brownies, and Juniors who are not quite ready for a week of resident camp, we are offering 2-weeks of Day Camp at Camp Tanglewood and Camp Low and a Mini Resident Camp session for Brownies and Juniors the first week in July at Camp Martha Johnston.

We are bringing back some favorite summer camp themes, like Harry Potter week at Tanglewood and Circus Camp at Camp Martha Johnston.

Alum are invited to participate in an upcoming Program event! We are holding our Bridging Savannah's Bridge event on Saturday, June 10th, and would love to have our alum there! This event will have participants taking trolleys from downtown Savannah over the big bridge to the South Carolina side of the Savannah River. A program will celebrate the significance of bridging in Girl Scouts. Once the participants walk across the bridge into downtown Savannah, they will receive a special patch commemorating their achievement. GSHG is holding a Capital Campaign to raise funds to preserve and update the Little House. The Little House has been a staple of Columbus, Georgia, and Girl Scouts of Historic Georgia since 1949. Generations of Girl Scouts have utilized this space. Few of these early Girl Scouts meeting places still exist today, so The Little House is truly a treasure for Girl Scouts of Historic Georgia. The expansion project will include an experience center, training facility, and enhanced outdoor space. It will also make it ADA-compliant, increasing accessibility for members and volunteers with disabilities. With these changes, we will offer new programs related to our four pillars: STEM, Outdoors, Entrepreneurship, and Life Skills. We are currently at 75% of our goal. GSHG Alum Spotlight Nancy Reimer

Nancy Reimer, a proud Girl Scout alum, became a Brownie in the fall of 1963 and thus began her journey in Girl Scouts with her troop leader Dorothy "Dot" Dowling. She advanced from Junior to Cadette to Senior levels under Dot's guidance before she graduated high school. Nancy credits Girl Scouts with making her who she is today and says she made a lifetime of memories and friendships through Girl Scouts.

Nancy's Girl Scout adventures included camping, cooking, canoeing, parades, community service, hiking, summer camps, Eco Action days, Girl Scouts Sundays, badge work, and trips to Gatlinburg, Atlanta, Savannah, the beach, Disney World, and the highlight trip, a two-week stay in Mexico when she was in high school. As an adult Girl Scout, Nancy has served on the 100th anniversary planning committee, chaired a fundraiser for heat and air for the cabins at Camp Okit, and still advocates for donations for Girl Scouts today.

Nancy's journey with Dot Dowling did not end when she graduated high school. She and Dot reconnected in 2021. Nancy is now calling and visiting Dot weekly. Nancy even hosted Dot's 88th birthday party in 2022 and is already planning to host her 90th birthday party in 2024! Nancy says she loves spending time with Dot and feels it's the least she can do for all Dot did for her during her formative years.







In Memorium Ann Glendenning

Vera Ann Skipper Glendenning, 84, of Savannah, Georgia, passed away on March 14, 2023. Ann was a founding member of Troop 2012-Savannah, and a beloved and courageous Girl Scout leader. Ann was the first Ride Leader for BRAG (Bike Ride Across GA), and an active volunteer in church and community.

Ann worked as a nursery school teacher, at The Gingerbread House, with her good friend Carol Giles. After 11 years, she began working at The Village Craftsmen, on River Street, selling her pottery from which she retired in 2011. She spent later years volunteering at the St. Thomas Thrift Store. Ann was a Girl Scout leader and took a group of girls to Wyoming in the summer of 1977, sightseeing on the way to the Girl Scout Camp. She led many girls on camping trips and other Girl Scout adventures. She most recently joined the retired leader troop in Savannah

In conjunction with the luncheon, Dr. Lear held a bat program at Camp Low that evening. Girl Scouts made bat wings, learned bat facts, and went on a bat walk where they were able to use a device that plugs into a mobile phone or tablet and allows you to hear bat echolocations in real time, record them, and identify the species. The girls were able to identify 5 different types of bats during their walk.

From First Headquarters to You

...I Would Like to Sail the Ocean Blue...

Spring has sprung and the Daisies – and other Girl Scouts, of course – are in full bloom all over Savannah! "Spring Break Season" is a busy time for historic sites across the city, especially at GSHG's own Girl Scout First Headquarters Museum. We've recently had Girl Scouts of all ages, from our tiniest Daisies to our most experienced Alums, visit from across the nation. One troop who stopped in for a tour in March was a treat to FHQ staff, as well: Troop 6320 from the Girl Scouts of Wisconsin Southeast – a Mariner Troop! The girls made the switch from being a traditional Girl Scout troop to a Mariner troop just prior to the pandemic, and they've been learning new skills and planning adventures - on land and water - ever since. Speaking of water; the girls left Wisconsin in a blizzard only to visit Savannah during a time of active thunderstorms. They asked to extend their stay at FHQ to avoid getting caught in one such storm only to end up helping another Girl Scout troop visiting from Tennessee who weren't as lucky dodging the downpour. Talk about begin friendly and helpful, considerate and caring, and a sister to every Girl Scout!

While Troop 6320 was visiting, because of their understandable interest, we shared a more in-depth history of the Mariner program. We always share some of the basics of Mariner Girl Scouts with our visiting Troops; how they were "launched" in 1934 to give (at that time) "Senior" Girl Scouts additional opportunities to pursue sailing, boating, and other water-based activities. We were also excited to share with them a bit about one of Savannah's Mariner Troops. In the 1940s, the girls of Senior Troop 21 had earned 21 badges – intentionally, to match their troop number - and achieved their "Curved Bar," the highest award in Girl Scouting at that time. They were looking for another challenge to tackle, so many of the girls decided to make the switch to the Mariner program. The girls became known as the Mariner Ship "Savannah" (as Mariner's used honorary ship names rather than troop numbers) and were led by Mrs. Cunningham. Her daughter, Sue, was a member of both Troop 21 and the Ship "Savannah" and two of her uniforms are currently on display in the Museum, including her mariner middy blouse and shorts, seen behind the girls (on the right). We were also glad to allow the girls and leaders to spend time looking through a vintage Mariner handbook with the plan of incorporating some of the traditional activities into their current program.

After a quick ride to the put-in spot, they met their guides and loaded the rafts for their trip. Some girls (and adults) were flipped out, tossed out, and some even opted to jump out into the river when given the chance. The guides were all amazing, both in giving instructions and in retrieving the girls from the water. All the girls said that they would definitely go rafting again!

After rafting they spent the rest of the day relaxing at the campsite, hanging out on the dock, and playing cards in the tents. They then enjoyed a rare dinner out at a local pizza shop. "When most of society thinks of Girl Scouts, they imagine younger girls, but these girls are at an age that is golden and I cannot wait until these girls plan their next adventure, and invite me along." said troop leader, Carolyn Metroz.
